



Karen Perkins is a retired bilingual Spanish elementary teacher who taught in the Oakland Public Schools for 17 years and was a Union Representative for the Oakland Education Association.

A political activist from an early age, Karen participated in the anti-Vietnam war, civil rights, women's and LGBTQ rights movements of the 1960s and 1970s.

After retirement, she served 10 years on the Steering Committee of Parents for a Safer Environment, a group working to reduce and eliminate the use of toxic pesticides in Contra Costa County public schools, buildings, lands and waterways.

She is also a member of the Contra Costa Racial Justice Coalition, based in Richmond, which advocates for racial justice and immigrant rights. In 2020, Karen organized the Seniors for Sanders Club in Rossmoor and is involved in groups working for a livable environment.

Currently, Karen is on the Center's Advocacy Committee.



Michael Stein is a retired neurologist living with his wife, Jeannine in Walnut Creek. He grew up in Chicago and attended the University Of Illinois in Champaign/Urbana and then the University Of Illinois Medical School in Chicago.

He came west to do his internship in 1970 at Highland Hospital in Oakland and has been living in California ever since. Michael started his private neurology practice in Walnut Creek in 1977 and finally retired in 2010 after 33 years. He specialized in the diagnosis and treatment of headache. He was active in the efforts to establish a single payer healthcare system in California.

Since his retirement he has traveled and engaged in his hobby of playing the banjo. He is the proud father of two daughters, Laurel and Jessica, and now the grandfather to Rockwell, Slade, Maya and Anya.



Amneh Ma'bad is a Palestinian born in Jerusalem. She earned a Law degree from Al Quds University and Masters in International Studies from Birzeit University.

Amneh worked at Al Haq, the pre-eminent Palestinian human rights organization, and as a delegate to the Palestinian Legislative Council. She was trained in international humanitarian law and worked at integrating international conventions in Palestinian legislation. She has written numerous reports and articles for Palestinian publications and was editor / coordinator at Al Gesher (The Bridge).

She moved to California in 2006 with her late husband, Hisham Ahmed, a professor at St. Mary's College. Amneh now works as a teacher while raising two teenage children. She maintains very strong connections with her family in Jerusalem and elsewhere in Palestine.

Currently, Amneh serves on the Center's Advocacy Committee.



Bob Spies is a web developer living in Albany. He grew up in Southern California and moved to Northern California and got his MBA from U.C. Berkeley.

After college, he managed public housing programs but was forced to change careers due to the drastic cuts to the public housing budget made by the Reagan Administration. He has spent most of his career in various technical management roles.

Bob lives with his wife Karen, and has two grown sons. In 2016, he joined a volunteer citizen diplomacy effort, including a trip to Russia and Crimea.

Bob serves on the Advocacy Committee and is currently active in various groups focused on de-escalating the Ukrainian conflict and stopping the drift toward a military conflict with China.



Andrew Kodama is an educator, artist, and organizer born and raised in the East Bay. He graduated from Las Lomas High School in 2012 and attended Diablo Valley College before transferring to UC Berkeley, where he graduated with a degree in Sociology.

Andrew's involvement with the Peace Center began with the grassroots youth activist group, Diablo for Peace, in 2017. Through Diablo for Peace, Kodama along with former board members Emmy Akin and Andrea Miralles, worked with local students to put on social justice-themed workshops and events for the community.

Andrew served as the Director from 2019—2022 and is excited to continue working with the Center as a board member. He wants to focus on cultivating intergenerational connections between activists in our area. Currently, Andrew is on the Center's Events & Communications Committees.

Our Art and Writing Challenge was started in 1998 by former Center board member, Dennis Thomas, with the goal of developing and promoting peace in the community through education, community participation and activities that call for using conflict resolution and mediation.

The program provides middle and high school students with a different topic each year, with the intention of stimulating community discussion on issues affecting the lives of young people. Students are encouraged to produce artwork, essays, creative writing of all sorts as well as videos on the topic, with prizes for winners.

In 2019, the Center established our <u>Youth Activist Grant Award</u> as a way to recognize and honor young people in our community organizing around peace and justice. We want students to know that they can be powerful instruments of change and that the actions they take can have a huge impact in creating a more just and equitable world for all.

We want to recognize any young person or group of young people (grades 6-12) who has shown remarkable commitment, creativity, and perseverance in their activism work, despite the constraints of the past years. We welcome nominations from the community!

Since it began, thousands of submissions have been received for the challenge from throughout Contra Costa County. We can't wait to see the submissons we recieve this year. Our guiding theme / prompt will be made available via <u>www.creatingpeacefulschools.weebly.com</u> at the end of February.




